F. Walter Gleason
July 23, 1935 - March 10, 2024

Walt's love of the Heath fair dates back to when it was at its former location on South Road. When he was young, his dad would give him 50 cents to go to the Fair. He kicked up sawdust in the square dance with the best and would even take part in the chainsaw contest to see who could saw through a log fastest.

What he loved best was being in the barns prepping for the cows and sheep and assisting the bovine judges during the fair. He remembered when the Hamiltons, who lived down at the Dickinsons, would bring their entire herd of 50 cows.

In 1962, Walt played a significant role in moving the fairgrounds from the Dickinson property on South Road to its current location. He was instrumental in building the permanent fire pit for the Heath Fireman's BBQ which is a big draw at the fair. Walt was dedicated to the Heath Fire Department of which he was a member for 70 years, joining at the age of 16. Right up until his last year, he helped with the Heath fair Chicken BBQ, always a friendly face and a good story.

Walt always helped out preparing every area of the grounds for the fair. Being a Heath farmer, he knew how to modify, jimmy-rig, and fix things at the last minute or even in the midst of the fair. In the 70's and 80's before the Heath Firefighters did the Chicken BBQ, for fund raising, a "Wheel of Fortune" was set up so people could bet any amount between 25 cents and a dollar. Walt, who could build, or fix anything, built both the wheel and the booth that was used, which worked like a charm!

What is remembered fondly by all was Walt's sense of humor and welcoming spirit. In the early 80's Walt served as Heath Agricultural Society President and ran a fun and efficient meeting. He and his brother Earl always found something to laugh about. A good example of this was during a time when Walt, Earl and Louis Pasmino were lifting poles at the fairgrounds, Earl was having trouble reaching up, so Walt asked if he needed something to stand on. When the response was yes, Walt handed him a piece of paper, and everyone had a good laugh. Close your eyes; can you still hear them?



Walt's causal manner, love of the Heath Fair, and gift of storytelling was a pleasure that many folks got to enjoy and remember fondly. Whether that was while shucking corn before the BBQ with fellow fire fighters sharing stories of his growing up, farming and working at Deerfield Academy or visiting with folks in the barn looking at old pictures that his cousin Howard Dickinson took, answering questions about people in the photos and what they were doing, Walt was a treasure to the Heath fair and the town of Heath. He and his family, who were equally devoted to the fair, will be remembered for a long, long time.

GATE ENTRY INFORMATION

All Exhibitors Showing Animals

All exhibitors who are showing animals are eligible for 2 free entries on the day of the showing.

Ox Draw

The Driver and one hitcher are eligible for free entry.

Horse Draw Participants:

The driver and two hitchers are eligible for free entry.

Truck Pull Participants:

The Driver and one Pit Crew Member are eligible for free entry.

Antique Tractor Pull Participants:

Drivers are eligible for Free Entry.

Lawn Tractor Pull Participants:

The driver and one crew member or parent are eligible for free entry.

Vendors:

Each working Vendor is given two wrist bands that are good for the duration of the fair. Additional vendor wristbands - good for all 3 days - cost \$12.

Musicians:

Musicians playing in the band and band technical help are eligible for free entry.

Speakers:

Speakers and their spouse/partner and families are eligible for free entry.

Heath Agricultural Society

Volunteers:

Volunteers working a minimum of 4 hours for the fair get in free on the day they are working (tickets, parking, exhibit hall, draws, merchandise booth, etc.)



GENERAL RULES

- **No Pets except for show animal classes or service animals (certification required). Do not leave dogs in car.**
- **No smoking or vaping *anywhere* on the fairgrounds.**
- Please make sure that you have read and understood the rules for gate entry on the preceding page.
- If, in the judge's opinion, no exhibit warrants a 1st prize then none will be awarded in that category.
- The committee, judges, or fair management reserves the right to reject any exhibits they feel are not desirable.
- The Heath Agricultural Society has the right to limit entries to the space available.
- New animal classes may be listed and judged, provided there are three or more entries.
- Placings will be awarded based on the quality of the exhibit and the decision of the judges will be final.
- No telephone entries will be accepted.
- Entries may be withdrawn by the exhibitor at the last minute.
- Entry forms can be obtained on the fair's website, www.HeathFair.org, and in the back of this Premium Book. Exhibit Hall entry forms will be available in Heath Center at Sawyer Hall in the vestibule, at 18 Jacobs Road by the library entrance and the community board outside the main doors. - The Heath Agricultural Society is not responsible for loss or damage of any exhibit or any accident which may occur on the grounds.



LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES

- Exhibitors are expected to bring all bedding for animals.
- The superintendents of stock will allot space to the exhibitors.
- All required tests must be in the name of the owner or exhibitor.

ANTIQUE TRACTOR PULL

Friday, August 16, 5:30 PM

Check in at the Pulling Track, Enter at Gate 2 or 3

- Antique Tractors aged 1969 or older allowed for the pull.
- 2-wheel drive only
- No chains, no crawlers, no excessive modifications allowed.
- Tractors should be basically stock.
- A safe drawbar to accept a 6-inch hook at a maximum height of 20 inches is needed. A clevis hook with a 3-inch diameter is highly recommended.
- All weight must be secure, no loose weights allowed.
- Tractors will be weighed on a scale.
- Starting order for weight classes will be lightest to heaviest.
- **If you are going to display your tractor, wheel blocks are required.**

RULES

- The registration fee is \$20 per tractor. Only one pit crew member per tractor is permitted in the pit area. Wristbands will be issued. No more than one driver per tractor per heat.
- Check-in at the pulling track, all drivers and crew members must be present at that time.
- A complete waiver and application need to be filled in for all entrants.

- NO REFUNDS
- Helmets, shoes, and shirts are required. NO EXCEPTIONS
- Inspection of mowers will take place the day of the event. There must be wheelie bars on all lawn mowers. Wheelie bar will be inspected at the time of entry. Wheelie bars must hold up tractors. The Tractors front end cannot raise over 18" in height. No training wheels. Strictly Stock tractors are the ONLY tractors that don't need wheelie bars. Stock tractors must remain stock from factory: stock turf tires and muffler.
- Mowing deck must be removed for safety reasons. Governor may be adjusted. Maximum of 25hp or less ALLOWED. MODIFICATION TO EXHAUST IS ALLOWED. You can use 2 motors on a lawn mower, but you will have to run it ONLY in the 1400 lbs. class and cannot exceed more than 25 hp.
- Tires can be filled. Chains are not allowed, weight may be added for stability. Weights and anything attached to the tractor must be properly secured. If the objects are not properly secured, they may have to be removed. No weights on seat. May not use weights as a seat. Nothing strapped on the hood. Driver must have a seat on tractor.
- All pull hitches can be made but they must have a hitch of 12 inches or less and must be solid to hold pull. Also, must have a 2" ring for the hitch.
- NO FOUR-WHEEL DRIVE TRACTORS ALLOWED.
- Pull will be 25ft long. Each tractor will be pulling 35 lb. blocks. Weight can go up to 3000 lbs. if tractor will pull.
- No standing up on lawn mower when lawn mower is in the middle of a pull. If this is done, the entrant will be disqualified.
- Track Marshall's word is final.
- No one younger than 5 years is allowed.

SPECIAL RULES for Age 5 to 12 years

- A responsible adult can help the child put the tractor in gear and back up to the boat. They cannot get on or run the tractor for them.
- Once the tractor is hitched, the responsible adult may not touch the tractor unless an emergency arises. If the tractor is touched, the puller will be disqualified. If tractor stops pull is over.
- The driver must put arms in the air and keep feet clear from the pedal when at the starting line.
- Driver must have a parent or responsible adult walk along side as they pull.
- If you have time, please spend some time with the child on the tractor backing up and stopping to have a safe pull.
- Any un-sportsman like conduct will not be tolerated and will lead to automatic disqualification.

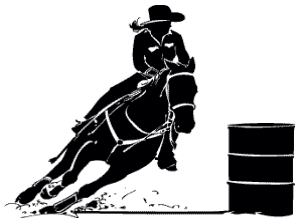

Truck Pull Rules:

1. All Entrants must have a valid driver's license.
2. All stock class participating trucks must be street legal, registered, and insured.
3. Those under 18 shall require parental/guardian authorization to pull.
4. Driver must always have complete control. No Hot-Rodding while on the track or pit.
5. Tires must be street legal.
6. All weight must be secure. You will be disqualified if anything falls off your truck.
7. Unsportsmanlike behavior will result in disqualification.
8. Any vehicle that leaves the boundaries of the course while pulling will be disqualified.
9. Hitch height of 26 in. maximum.
10. All vehicles must be in neutral or park while being hooked to sled.
11. Seat belts are recommended.
12. Number one puller is the test puller. They may or may not count the test pull —must decide while still hitched. If test pull is not counted, may pull immediately or drop back to end of class.
13. Only mechanical failure will allow puller to move to back of the line.
14. 75 ft. rule for mis-starts, wrong gear, etc. Only one more try.
15. Air bags are okay at proper height.
16. Street stock class must have a stock motor. No headers.
17. 10,000 lb. Open class may have dual wheels pulling. All other classes, only 4 wheels.
18. No nitrous oxide, blowers, or superchargers. No propane injection on diesel engines.

OBSTACLE CHALLENGE & GYMKHANA RULES

- All classes must be paid for and a number assigned to riders before entering the ring, divisions are one horse one rider combination, you may ride as many horses as you want as long as each combination has their own number and entry fees are paid for each combination. Numbers must be worn on the horse or rider, if you enter the ring without your number, you will be disqualified for that class.
- Horses may not have more than two riders for the day or may not be entered in more than two divisions for the day.
- ALL RIDERS 18 YRS OLD OR YOUNGER MUST WEAR AN APPROVED HELMET, NO EXCEPTIONS!! IF YOU HAVE TO BE TOLD MORE THAN TWICE TO PUT YOUR HELMET ON YOU WILL BE DISQUALIFIED FOR THE DAY WITHOUT A REFUND OF MONEY. We encourage ALL riders, regardless of age, to wear a helmet.
- Riders must wear shoes or boots with a heel, NO sneakers or flat soled shoes. Riders will be asked to change footwear. Absolutely NO BARE FEET
- Riders need to be listening for their class and be ready at the gate area. If you need a hold please notify the booth at least two classes prior to your class.
- A five second penalty will be given for each obstacle knocked over, riders will be disqualified for going off pattern or breaking the timer. A "Do Over" will only be offered if the timer has a problem. Show management's decision is final.
- Walk trot riders will be disqualified for that class if they canter more than 3 strides, if they get caught cantering on the show grounds, they will get a warning and then disqualified for the day without refund of entry fees
- Please keep the gate area clear at all times, if you have to be told more than twice to keep the gate area clear you will be disqualified for that class.

- Show management has the right to split and or combine classes or cancel classes and or divisions.
- Show management's decision is final, see manager for any questions or disputes.
- Any horse or person that is out of control or posing a danger may be asked to leave the show area and or show grounds.
- Show management has the right to first give a verbal warning, second a disqualification for that class, and third rider will be disqualified for the day without refund of entry fees and asked to leave the show grounds for excessive spurring, whipping, yanking on the horse's mouth, or any other abusive behavior.
- No dogs on the show grounds unless it is a certified service dog.
- There will be a \$40 fee on all returned checks, and you will be asked to pay in cash after that.
- **Please bring a muck fork and clean up around your trailer.**

SHOW RULES

1. **Sanctioning:** The ABGA show is sanctioned with the American Boer Goat Association. All 2024 ABGA Sanctioned Show Rules shall govern.
2. **Entries:**
 - Early Entries: \$10.00 per animal by August 9, 2024
 - Late Entries: \$20.00 per animal by August 14, 2024No day of show entries. NO REFUNDS.
Submit entries online at www.heathfair.org.
3. **Substitutions:** One substitution will be allowed per class per exhibitor. Substitutions must be made at the time of check-in.
4. **Penning:** A limited number of animal pens in the barn are available on a first come first served basis. Please do not use animal pens for tack. All pens must be cleaned out at the conclusion of the show, with bedding piled in the center of the barn. Exhibitors may show out of their trailers and are responsible for cleaning up their area at the conclusion of the show.
5. **ABGA Show Eligibility:** All goats entered in the ABGA show must be registered in the ABGA herd book at the time of the show. Original registration certificates are required, except that a copy of a registration application, stamped with the date received by ABGA, can be accepted for kids less than 3 months of age. Animals over the age of 3 months of age must be verified as registered in the ABGA database at the time of the show. An animal that may be verified as registered in the web-based database of ABGA will be accepted in lieu of a registration certificate. Verification must be provided by the exhibitor in either digital or print to the show secretary. Goats registered in a frozen or suspended account are ineligible to exhibit in an ABGA Sanctioned Show.
6. **Market Goat Eligibility:** Market Goat entries are open to any breed or crossbreed of any age. All goat entered in the market class must be either females or castrated males. Disbudding or horn tipping is not

required. Animals entered in the market goat show do not need to be registered with ABGA or any other registry and may not also be exhibited in the ABGA show. Market goats must be clipped to the skin with a uniform clip above the knee and hock joints. Market goat entries may be divided into multiple classes on the day of the show, depending on the number of entries.

7. **Health Regulations:** All animals entering a Massachusetts fairground from out of state or within the state must be accompanied by a valid certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) dated January 1, 2024, or later signed by an accredited veterinarian certifying that the animal is clinically free of infectious or contagious disease and exposure from such disease. Health certificates must be available upon request to fair inspectors. Animals may be inspected prior to unloading. Animals showing evidence of pinkeye, sore mouth, abscesses, or other infectious disease will not be permitted to unload and will be asked to leave with a forfeiture or entry fees. Rabies vaccination is encouraged but not required. Full rules and requirements are available at: <https://www.mass.gov/doc/ne-fairs-and-shows-cvi-requirements/download>
8. **Identification:** All goats entered in ABGA classes must have legible tattoos or permanent microchip identification consistent with registration certificate or the animal will be disqualified. Market goats must have USDA approved individual tag, tattoo, or electronic implant that complies with Federal Scrapie Eradication Program requirements.
9. **Ages:** Birth dates, as listed on the registration certificate, will be used to determine the animal's age for class divisions. Base date for age is the show date: August 16, 2024.
10. **Disqualification:** Any goat showing a pronounced defect or abnormality will be barred from showing in the ABGA show. Artificial coloring will be a disqualification. Identification that is missing, illegible, or inconsistent with registration and/or CVI will result in disqualification. Any doe over 24 months of age that has not kidded or cannot prove a current pregnancy will not be eligible to show.
11. **Premiums & Placements:** Show premiums will be paid according to the Judge's official placement in the show ring. The judge's decision will be final.
12. **Showmanship:** Youth showmanship competitions will start at 5pm. All goats used for showmanship must be entered in their appropriate ABGA or market goat class. Age divisions may be combined at the discretion of show management.
13. **Goat exhibitors will be granted two free (2) Heath Fair entry passes. All other people with the exhibitor must pay the posted fair entry fee.**

*** Note from judge on garlic bulbs:**

Garlic bulbs should be a well-formed and free of blemishes though some black spots on the inner wrappings, which is a sign of some sort of fungal presence, would be ok, just not too much if possible. Garlic should be clean but not scrubbed with as little peeling as possible. A little dirt is always ok...but not cakes of dirt...a little goes a long way when showing. Judges look for a uniform exhibit, well sized but not necessarily the largest, bulbs. Cut the tops of the bulb to one inch in length, and the bottoms between a 1/2 inch and 3/4 inch. If the inner core of any cut top is not pure white, look for another bulb. At times this is difficult to do depending on the variety, but it becomes especially important if the competition is stiff and you're looking for a little edge.

CANNING

High acid fruits, preserves, pickles, and relishes must be sealed by hot water bath processing. Low acid vegetables, and no-acid fruits must be sealed by pressure.

CANNING Guidelines for sections 19 and 20

SOME THINGS TO LOOK FOR:

1. Product should be of the best quality, near uniform in size and good color and labeled.
2. Liquid should be clear, no sediment and of good color.
3. Containers should be mason-type tempered glass jars of the required volume, uniform, clean, properly sealed and displayed without metal bands/rings.
4. Head space must be appropriate for the item canned (headspace is stated in each recipe and is important to ensure a proper vacuum as the jar cools and seals. Too much headspace may cause an incomplete vacuum and too little may cause food to boil out during processing. In general, ½ inch headspace is recommended for vegetables and pickles and ¼ inch headspace for jams and jellies.
5. Glass dome top jars are acceptable.
6. Product must be home-made since the previous Heath Fair.

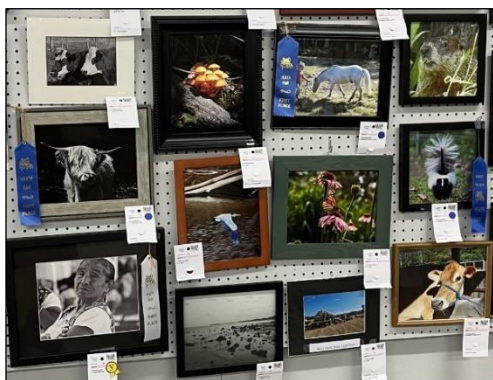

SOLOMON TEMPLE BARN

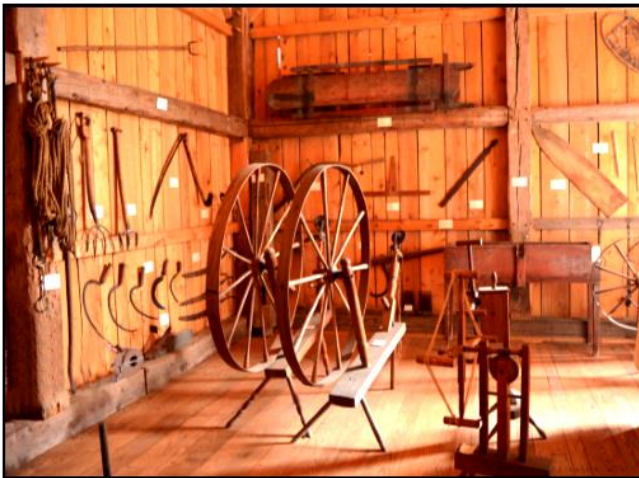
Visit the Solomon Temple Barn on the Heath Fairgrounds

Historic farm tools, looms, spinning wheels and agricultural machinery are on display in the Solomon Temple Barn. Built by Solomon Temple on his property on Avery Brook Road in the 1770s, the barn remained there for nearly two centuries.

In 1993, the barn was donated by the Rev. Richard Gary and his wife Dorothy to the Heath Historical Society. In the spring of that year, a new foundation was laid at the Heath Fairgrounds; in the fall the barn was meticulously dismantled, with each piece's original location noted for reassembly in its new home. In May of 1994, in the culmination of the effort and support of well over a hundred people—Society members, community members, and businesses—the barn was reassembled on its current site, and dedicated to the preservation of Heath agricultural artifacts, and the education of future generations about the farming culture of Heath.

"These venerable barn members surrounding us today have withstood 8 or 9 major wars, a devastating depression, severe forest fires and innumerable onslaughts by the weather. Yet here they stand, straight and tall as the trees they once were, and wearing their new raiment proudly."

DIRECTIONS

WORDS OF WARNING! It is likely your GPS will lead you astray if you put in a street address. ***The best way to get here is to follow the directions below.***

COMING THROUGH COLRAIN: Coming up Colrain-Stage Road, **do not turn onto Hosmer Road.** Hosmer Road is a loop and the east end is not passable after a certain point. Continue up the hill on Colrain Stage Road until you see the fairgrounds, which are on the west end of the Hosmer Road loop.

FROM ROUTE 2, WEST OF CHARLEMONT HEADED EAST: Turn left on Route 8A out of Charlemont Center. Follow 8A and take a right onto Dell Road. Follow that through the center of Heath. Take a left onto Bray Road. When Bray Road ends, take a left onto Colrain Stage Road. The fairgrounds will be on your right.

FROM ROUTE 2, GREENFIELD HEADED WEST: Stay on Route 2 west until you see the sign for Heath Center. Turn right onto Avery Brook Road and bear right when the road splits. Follow this to the end and bear left onto Main Street. Shortly after, take a right onto Bray Road. When Bray Road ends, take a left onto Colrain Stage Road. The fairgrounds will be on your right.

FROM VERMONT, ROUTE 8A HEADED SOUTH: Follow 8A South into Heath and take a LEFT onto Branch Hill Road. Fairgrounds will be on the left past the Transfer station.

FROM VERMONT, ROUTE 112 SOUTH: Follow Route 112 to Colrain Center. If you are pulling a large trailer, it is recommended that you do **not** turn right in Colrain Center when 112 turns right. Go straight onto Greenfield Road and then take a right onto Route 2 west. Autos can continue on using Rt 112 to reach Route 2 west since they do not require tight turns. Follow Route 2, Greenfield Headed West directions to reach the fairgrounds.

A NOTE ON CASH/ATMS:

Many of our vendors now take virtual payments with Square and Venmo, but we recommend bringing cash for food and those vendors not set up for virtual payments. **There is NO ATM in Heath and cell service is limited.**

We recommend that you stop in Shelburne falls for ATMs at the local banks OR stop in Charlemont Center for the ATM at the gas station.

RULES GOVERNING PULLING CONTESTS

Approved by Mass. Department of Agricultural Resources Bureau of Fairs

Rules prefixed O applies to oxen only.

Rules prefixed H applies to horses only.

Rules prefixed P applies to ponies only.

All other rules apply equally to horses, ponies & oxen.

1. The fairs pulling events committee shall be charged with promulgating and enforcing all rules and guidelines pertaining to pulling events in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The committee shall consist of two members representing the Mass. Department of Agricultural Resources, the Mass. Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Mass Fairs Association, Pull Superintendent, Pull Judges, Pony Pull Association, Horse Pull Association and the Oxen Pull Association.
2. There shall be a fair superintendent and up to three judges in charge at all drawing contests. They shall be vested with the authority to disqualify any team or driver for any cause that in their judgment might be detrimental to the best interest of the public, animals or the organization conducting the contest. An official will be designated to determine the proper use of the reins, whip or goad stick. The sole responsibility of 1 judge is to just JUDGE THE CLASS and to ensure compliance with the rules and regulations.
3. The judges and superintendent shall be qualified in stone boat contests and shall have full jurisdiction to decide the weight of the load at any time and to decide anything relative to the actual drawing.
4. Any individual, firm or corporation found guilty of administering drugs, which may affect the conduct, actions, endurance, strength, speed or performance of any animal competing in any pulling competition within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, shall forfeit all prize monies won that day. First offense would consist of a \$500 fine and a 30-day suspension to be served from May 15 through October 30. Second Offense will result in a \$1000 fine and a 1-year suspension; a third offense will result in the teamster being barred for life. (All fines payable to the Mass. Fair Association and mailed to George Dole, 72 Anderson Road, Shelburne Falls, MA 01370.) Any Teamster who refuses to assist the Vet in testing any animal, or refuses to have an animal tested, will be guilty of a First Offense drug violation, punishable by a \$500 fine and a 30-day suspension to be served from May 15 through October 30.
5. Any owner and/or teamster who has been convicted or found in violation of any other state's statute relating to the use of drugs or stimulants, or other animal protection statute shall be barred from participation in any contest, in this state, for the period prescribed by that state. All testing will be done before the first load or after the last load.
6. Any team disqualified by an agent of Humane Society appointed under Chapter 22C, Section 57, of The M.G.L. shall be taken out of the contest immediately. Before any team is taken out, there should be consultation among the

Humane Society, superintendent and judges, and may be announced to the public by the judges.

7. All participants will be properly dressed. Any exhibitor, judge or superintendent who has been drinking alcoholic beverages will be disqualified from the contest and removed from pulling area. Breathalyzers may be used at pulling events to determine if an individual has been drinking. The drinking of alcoholic beverages in and around the ring is prohibited. Any foul or abusive language to the public or anyone connected with the draw, by the driver or his helpers, will cause the driver and team to be disqualified immediately. First offense may result in fines up to \$250 and a 2-week suspension; Second offense may result in a one-year suspension and fines up to \$1000; third offense teamster will be barred for life. Anyone disputing the decision of the judges will be immediately disqualified and fined \$100. If the teamster is fined, the teamster will not be able to pull until the fines are paid. (All fines payable to the Mass. Fair Association and mailed to George Dole, 72 Anderson Road, Shelburne Falls, MA 01370.)
8. Sores and abrasions caused or likely to be irritated by the bearing surface of harnesses or yokes will deem the animal unfit for use in the contest, decision to be made by superintendent or judges. Any lame animal will not be allowed to pull. Lameness, mechanical in nature and that doesn't cause pain or suffering, as certified by a licensed Veterinarian on a health certificate dated within the previous twelve months, will be allowed to pull.
9. Teams deemed uncontrollable or teamsters losing control, that go beyond the defined pit area, will be immediately disqualified by the Superintendent or judges and removed from the contest. Each fair will mark a defined pit area and make it known at the Driver's meeting prior to each class. In addition, any driver that pulls the load beyond the defined pit area will be penalized - 1st offense will be loss of that hitch; 2nd offense is disqualification for the day and forfeit of entire day's premiums.
10. **HP**-All horses and ponies to compete in contest, other than Free-For-All Teams, shall be weighed in no earlier than three hours before competition. Check weighing will be permitted before the three-hour period prior to the first class. Horses must wear halters while on scale. All horses and ponies will be weighed in the presence of a delegate appointed by the fair, organization or person who is conducting the contest. The delegate shall present weigh-bill to the teamsters, a copy of which is to be kept by said delegate, certifying the horses or ponies name and description as certified by a negative coggins certificate at the exact time of weighing. The scale shall be balanced with a person standing on it, this person shall hold all horses or ponies. The person holding horses or ponies shall be appointed by the delegate if he/she is unable to do this himself/herself. The delegate must sign the weighing certificate. It is the judge's discretion of whether animals can be weighed with or without blanket coverage.
11. **O**-All oxen will be weighed in front of the sponsoring delegate; all weight classes shall be under 2400 lbs., 2400 lbs-2800 lbs., 2801-3200 lbs., over 3200 lbs. and or Free-For-All.

12. **O**-All weight classes will increase 100 lbs. for the Labor Day weekend events and remain until the end of the season. **H**-All weight classes will increase by 1% for the Labor Day weekend events and remain until the end of the season.
13. **P**-All owners/ponies must have proof of measuring by the N.E. Draft Pony Association to pull in a contest. All weight classes shall be under 1200 lbs.; 1200-1400 lbs.; 1401-1800 lbs. and over.
14. **H**-Horse weight classes; 1-day events-3000 lbs. and under; 3001 lbs.-3300 lbs.; 3301 lbs.- 3600 lbs.; Free-For-All. 2-day events weights will be at the discretion of the fair.
15. **HPO**-Once a team has been weighed in, there will be no switching of horses, ponies or oxen. Split owner teams will be allowed to compete for premiums. Any claimed owner must remain with his horses, ponies, or oxen for the duration of contest.
16. **HPO**-Starting load: maximum load of 4000 lbs. for all weight classes and 5000 lbs. Free-For-All classes. Added loads in each class at the discretion of the judges depending on type of pit. At no time after weight has been increased, may it be decreased.
17. Pulling positions to be determined by the drawing of numbers just before starting each class.
18. All teamsters to compete in contest shall have their teams ready at the published time and **MUST** attend drivers meeting. All classes will close at the completion of the first heat of each class.
19. There shall be a time limit of five (5) minutes. Time will be taken out while the boat is positioned for the next hitch. The time will be kept by the announcer, or appointed timekeeper.
20. Method of Pull: Three hitches with a 5-minute time limit. The boat to be pulled back to the starting pin after hitch. There will be no heading of horses. Teams to be driven by one teamster only. Starting point of the boat shall be properly marked to indicate same starting point for all loads. The distance of each pull will be measured from the center of the boat to the most recent pin. All teams will be allowed three hitches to qualify the load. The boat shall be returned to starting pin after each hitch. **OPTION: Oxen pullers may have the option to have 5-hitches from the pin while staying hooked to the boat, with a 5-minute time limit. At no time should the boat begin at 72" or more from the pin. Teamster may request that the boat be set back to the pin. 5-HITCH PULLS MUST BE PUBLICLY PRE-ADVERTISED PRIOR TO THAT DAY.**
21. **P**-Use of reins is prohibited for any purpose other than to guide the team. Hats and hands on the hindquarters only. Hands must be in sight at all times.
22. **H**-One inch or more constitutes a hitch.
23. **O**-Two inches or more constitutes a hitch.
24. **P**-3 inches or more constitutes a hitch.
25. Breakdown: An actual separation, braking or bending of equipment shall constitute a breakdown. In the event the teamster and/or owner wishes credit for the distance the boat moved before breakage, it would constitute a hitch.

26. Over the rail: If an animal's foot strikes dirt outside the rail, it constitutes a hitch with no credit for the distance pulled. Teams must remain within the rail while hitched to the boat. Teams must be unhooked from the boat if they step over the rail.
27. Any team deliberately driven over the rail will be disqualified from the contest.
28. All teams shall remain in the ring at all times, until class is completed or unless excused by the judge.
29. In case of a tie on longest distance, the second longest distance already pulled will take the top placing.
30. Changing Teamsters: No teamster may be changed after pulling the first load in any class except in an emergency, then only when permitted by judges.
31. **HP-Interferences of Evener Men.** No assistance other than hitching. Evener Men WILL NOT go ahead of evener, and are to remain silent and do no waving of arms while a team is being set up or is hitched to the load.
32. **O-Hitchers** will not be allowed to twist tails or use the chain or any other device to stimulate the cattle. They cannot carry anything in their hands but the chain to hitch the cattle. They then shall stand back of boat at a distance prescribed by the judge.
33. Classes shall be as publicized in Premium Booklet or by Fair/Pull.
34. **O-A** twisted whip with a braided lash or a goad stick may be used in the pit or on the fairgrounds. The goad stick must not be over 4 ft. Long and must not exceed an inch diameter on the small end. The goad stick may be taped with tape but not weighted. The goad shall have no brad in it. Plastic goad sticks may be used, but must be wrapped with black tape. Any driver causing a welt, swelling or drawing blood with the whip or goad stick will be fined \$100 per infraction. Second offenses may include suspensions.
35. **O-The** whip or goad stick shall only be used to guide the oxen outside of the pit area. The whip or goad stick may be used lightly to place the oxen, after being hitched to the boat. Then the oxen may be touched once only to start the boat and once only while the boat is in motion. 2 hits only to animal or yoke. There will be NO RUNNING of teams within the ring and pit areas. No use of butt end of whip or goad stick will be allowed.
36. **O-The** chain shall not be hitched to the boat while it is under, around or in front of the oxen's legs. (Only when the Chain is between the animals.)
37. **O-No** driver shall strike the ox in the face except to guide the animal with an open hand. The goad stick or whip may be used lightly in the area of the animal's ears and horns for the steering of the animals only. No use of hands as a twitch on the nose, or in the nostrils.
38. The only persons allowed in the pit and ring areas are Fair Officials, drivers, the person hitching the boat, agents of the Humane Society appointed under chapter 22C, Section 57, M.G.L. and the Bureau of Fairs Inspectors, only pertinent personnel allowed and at the discretion of the Judges.
39. **O-All** calves over the age of twelve (12) months must be castrated to show or enter any classes.
40. **O-Age** of oxen and steers should be judged as of day of event.

41. **H**-The number of times a horse draws will be left up to the discretion of the fair.
42. **OHP**-No animals will be blind folded.
43. **H**-In horse pulls the use of reins as a whip is prohibited. The light use of reins on entry to the pit and while team is making its draw, will be limited to that area from the root of the tail to the bottom of the round. **IN A SIDE ARM MOTION ONLY.** Hands must be in sight at all times. The use of the reins after the boat has stopped or any place on the grounds is prohibited. Lines must be doubled. Reins may be taped together only if no wider than the width of your hand with a single wrapping of tape.
44. The pit will be covered the day before the draw, when it is possible.
45. Participation in pulling events within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has been determined to be a privilege and not a right. Participation in these events are discretionary. Individuals are only permitted to enter these contests if the judges, superintendents and fairs deem it advisable. Individuals who blatantly disregard these rules and regulations and place animals or the public at risk will not be allowed entry to these family events.
46. If an incident should arise and warrants a hearing, a majority of the Massachusetts Agricultural Fair Associations Pulling Events Committee can make a decision pertaining to, but not limited to, disciplinary action. Any infractions are to be made known to the offending party by certified mail within 30 days of the infraction. The offending party has the right to either pay the fine or appeal the decision within 30 days of receipt of notification. Failure to acknowledge notification will result in suspension from all pulling events until the fine(s) have been paid, or the decision of the Committee has been revoked.
47. **STATEMENT OF OWNERSHIP** - The signature on said form verifies that I have read, understood and agree to abide by The Massachusetts Fairs Assoc. Rules Governing Pulling Contests and that the Judge(s) decisions in these competitions are **FINAL**.
48. Any variation of these rules shall be in the spirit of aforesaid rules and at discretion of the judges.

2024 ANIMAL HEALTH RULES FOR FAIRS AND SHOWS

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES/FAIRS

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance of the fair:

Special Note: Due to the continuing US outbreak of High Path Avian Influenza (HPAI), Animal Health Officials from all six New England States may recommend postponing competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps, or other in-person events encouraging the gathering or comingling of

domestic fowl or poultry. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented.

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance for the fair.

NO animal will be admitted to the fairgrounds unless it meets the requirements below. NO animal is to be unloaded or enter a barn or tie-out stall until the animal and its paperwork have been inspected and approved for entry.

A. General Rules for All Animals: See M.G.L. c. 128 §2C, 129 §2

1. All animals must be in proper physical condition, be properly identified and free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease at time of arrival. Specific diseases and conditions which will disqualify an animal for entry are identified for each species in the following sections of the rules. Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.

2. Evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in the animal's rejection for entry. THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION IS FINAL.

3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly-licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

4. Official ID: See Final Rule: Summary of Traceability for Livestock Moved Interstate (Summary of general requirements by species) All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved for the species, e.g., official metal ear tag, tattoo, scrapie tag, or microchip. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification.

5. Health Certificates: -- One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (*CT, *ME, MA, **NH, RI, and ***VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates

and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved. Note that *CT, *ME, **NH, and ***VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter period of time and may have additional language, movement and permit requirements.

For the 2024 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have official certificates of veterinary inspection (OCVIs) that meet the following requirements:

- a.** MA and RI: OCVIs issued on or after January 1, 2024 may be used for those animals being shown at multiple fairs and shows in MA, and RI through the 2024 show/fair season ending October 31, 2024. MA - Notes: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires an Infectious Disease Waiver (provided by The Big E) for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition. All Bovines must have official RFID tags.
- b.** CT and ME: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture (860-713-2504) or ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits or questions.
- c.** NH: * * NH: To qualify for the extended CVI, animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after April 1, 2024 to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31. The extended CVI is not available for animals that do not reside in New England. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for details and permits.
- d.** ***VT: Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802-828-2421) for specific import requirements that deviate from the general information in this letter and must be met for legal import of livestock.
- e.** A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited. MA animals being shown ONLY in MA may substitute a signed, dated letter on the letterhead of an accredited veterinarian for an OCVI if all required information is included and all additional requirements are met.
- f.** Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.

g. An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.

i. A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.

ii. That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).

h. The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the “destination” on the OCVI form. In addition, “See attached list” or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.

i. Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were actually on show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.

j. Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2024 for health reasons it must have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.

k. Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

All petting zoos are required to have a USDA APHIS Exhibitor’s License (as needed) and valid 2024 health certificates.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EACH SPECIES ARE LISTED BELOW

B. Cattle: See M.G.L. c. 129 §§2, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor’s state can be obtained from the state veterinarian’s office in each state. If the exhibitor’s state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795 or 857-348-3922). All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox and open or draining wounds.

2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated for rabies.

3. Note: The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle entering the Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2024. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact fair office with questions.

C. Poultry: See M.G.L. c. §§2, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02.

1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.

2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum- typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.

3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood- tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date.

4. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.

5. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2024, shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out-of-state exhibitors.

6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty days of the fair will be admitted.

D. Goats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals.

2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds. All goats must also be free of sore mouth and scrapie exposure.

3. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363- 2290.

E. Camelids (Llamas, Alpacas, etc.): See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, M.G. l. c. 131, §23 ,321 CMR 9.02.

1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current

brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795 or 857-348-3922).

2. All Camelids originating from outside the Commonwealth are required to be tested for Blue Tongue. Exception: Animals from a USDA declared "Low Incident State" are exempt. New England and New York are low incident states.

3. All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds.

F. Swine: See M.G.L. c. 129 §14E, 330 CMR 11.04(2), 9 CFR 71.19

1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration. 2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, mange and open or draining wounds.

3. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.

4. No person shall import into Massachusetts swine from Stage I or Stage II Pseudorabies States.

5. All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or monitored herds in qualified pseudorabies-free States only. The pseudorabies status of the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state.

G. Sheep: See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

1. No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous eighteen months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.

2. No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which sore mouth has existed or in which sore mouth Vaccine has been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.

3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, sore mouth, pink eye, ringworm, and open and draining wounds. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

H. Equine: M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C, 44, 330 CMR 16.05.

1. All equines entering a Massachusetts fairground must have a valid health certificate. Note: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires for an Infectious Disease Waiver (provided by The Big E) signed by the exhibitor for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition.

2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.

3. All equines originating from both within and outside of the Commonwealth must have a negative USDA approved EIA test (i.e., Coggins test or ELISA test) dated within twelve months of entry.

4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and WNV within one year of the fair.

I. Rabbits: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2 Rabbits must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: rabbit hemorrhagic Disease Virus 2(RHDV2), snuffles, wet tail, and skin and ear infections. Microchips may be used for ID in rabbits originating in MA.

J. Dogs and Cats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §39G

1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm, and mange.

2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies.
